



PGD Training Health Improvement

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Requirements for Accreditation

Pharmacists wishing to provide services must complete the following accreditation:

- 1. CPPE distance learning: Safeguarding Adults and Children Level 2 (1.5 hours to complete)
- Attendance at a training event hosted by B&NES Council; tonight!
- 3. Successfully undertake a DBS enhanced check
- 4. Signed enhanced service contract issued by Virgin Care
- 5. Sign the doxycycline PGD

We require you to submit evidence of **all** these items before you commence the service. Evidence is submitted through self enrolment on Pharmoutcomes.

If you are attending for update we still require evidence that all the above is in place.





Pharmacy sexual health service structure

- Condoms, chlamydia tests, pregnancy tests (can be provided by pharmacist and suitably trained support staff)
- Levonorgestrel for EHC and Doxycycline for positive asymptomatic chlamydia infection (can be provided by accredited pharmacist only via PGD)





Condom provision (≤24)

- Via C-card scheme A coordinated approach to condom distribution, which offers free condoms to 13-24 year olds in BANES.
- Registration through a consultation with a trained professional at a registered venue
- Pharmacies are usually an ongoing supply venue, and not there to register new clients. A full list of venues can be found on the website www.safebanes.com
- Pharmacies can become registration points –counter staff may be able to deliver this – but as likely to involve work with u16s requires those staff to have DBS checks
- Provision of one pack per visit, pack consists of written info, condoms, lube and signposting info
- Record on Pharmoutcomes







Advantages of the C Card Scheme


The C Card:

- » Supports and empowers young people to access free condoms and confidential information and support
- » Supports a holistic approach to sexual health which lends the opportunity to talk to individuals about broader sexual health and relationship issues
- » Strengthens the 'SAFE' brand which ensures quality and consistency across partner agencies
- » Gives young men an alternative route into sexual health services
- » Provides a flexibility to sexual health services.









- •Number of new registrations have declined from 2009/10 (the first full year of Ccard) to 2019/20 by 77%, and the number of repeat visits has decreased by 87% over the same period
- Under-reporting by venues likely to be impacting data
- •C-card registrations and repeat visits continue to decline. It is not clear whether this is because of data collection issues or a true reflection. Lack of data is likely to be a significant factor.





Where do we go from here?

- If your service would like to offer Ccards we provide one-off Free training to staff and refresher sessions as needed
- Free Ccards and condoms provided







Chlamydia test kits (≤24)

- Can provide chlamydia test kits opportunistically e.g. with the dispensing of contraceptives, sale of condoms
- Pharmacy orders kits via Avon Chlamydia Screening Programme (0117 342 9299; csp.avon@UHbristol.nhs.uk)
- Avon Chlamydia Screening Programme provide dual chlamydia and gonorrhoea test



Chlamydia test kits (≤24)

- Different tests available for men (urine) and women (vaginal selfswab)
 - Men must not have urinated for 1 hr. prior to providing a sample & preferably catch the first part of the urine
 - Women can be tested during their period but not advisable. The female kits come with preservative liquid already in them
- No need to record on Pharmoutcomes





Pregnancy test kits (≤24)

- Provide free pregnancy test kit from pharmacy stock upon request OR where the pharmacist deems a clinical need — e.g. where someone feels they might be pregnant
- Repeat issues can be made but client should be encouraged to access sexual health services to discuss contraceptive methods; also consider safeguarding
- Do not get involved in decision making, discussion of options or interpretation of results
- Record on Pharmoutcomes





EHC provision via PGD (>13s - <25)

- For female clients only ©
- All requests must be dealt with personally by pharmacist in the consultation room
- Follow PGD and if EHC is required dispense and provide leaflets, offer condoms, can offer chlamydia kit if appropriate
- If EHC not required, explain why, refer/signpost if appropriate
- Record on Pharmoutcomes





For both PGDs, the client should leave with...

Verbal information

Pharmoutcomes has a check list to assist you, with links for further information

Written information

- Patient Information Leaflets
- Contact details for sexual health services





Referral and signposting

Each pharmacist must be individually accredited to work under the PGDs.

If an accredited pharmacist is not available in pharmacy then ensure you can signpost to another provider (please ensure your locums and wider pharmacy staff are aware of this)


Options may include:

- 1. Another pharmacy with an accredited pharmacist (phone to check if accredited pharmacist is available first)
- 2. Local sexual health services (The Riverside Clinic)
- 3. GP surgery
- 4. OTC sale








Why is it important to address young people's sexual health?



Chlamydia screening and detection rates

S 5 F E

In 2019 B&NES was lower than the national average for both Chlamydia screening and detection rates. It is important for young people to feel confident to access screening and treatment for STI's.











7 out of 10 pupils in Year 10 know where to get condoms free of charge





8 out of 10 boys and 9 out of 10 girls in Year 10 said that the pill was reliable for preventing pregnancy





2 out of 10 Year 8 pupils and 6 out of 10 Year 10 pupils said that they know how to prevent chlamydia





2 out of 10 pupils in Year 10 said that they have had sex

What is SAFE?



Quality assurance scheme offered to all organisations in B&NES that provide sexual health services, information and advice to young people aged 13-24.

Why become SAFE branded?

- Increase the visibility, trust, consistency and uptake of sexual health services locally
- Develop a benchmark of quality standards to enhance existing service provision to young people.



In a nut shell.... if your SAFE accredited, young people know that they will feel safe and welcomed in your service when they see the SAFE logo

Child Sexual Exploitation

Child sexual exploitation is a form of child sexual abuse. It occurs where an individual or group takes advantage of an imbalance of power to coerce, manipulate or deceive a child or young person under the age of 18 into sexual activity (a) in exchange for something the victim needs or wants, and/or (b) for the financial advantage or increased status of the perpetrator or facilitator. The victim may have been sexually exploited even if the sexual activity appears consensual. Child sexual exploitation does not always involve physical contact; it can also occur through the use of technology.
